#### A PURPOSE

This degree is designed to provide education in Cultural Heritage, with a strong focus on History of Art, Architecture and Archaeology, principally with respect to Italian Cultural Heritage from the Medieval to the Contemporary period. The programme covers practical and theoretical approaches to the key issues and working practices in the field of cultural heritage and is aimed at both those who wish to study cultural heritage as an academic subject, and those who might wish to obtain employment in the broad sector. The degree caters for students from a wide range of academic disciplines who wish to study a rapidly growing interdisciplinary field. The programme's rationale is at the crossroads of several major European concerns:

- a focus on heritage and the rich European history and cultural diversity by providing an environment where new ways of harvesting and disseminating such information will be discovered;
- the improvement of the professional value of Humanities' graduates through the combination of interdisciplinary knowledge and high level generic competences;
- the creation of the European Higher Education Area by bringing together diverse and high quality academic traditions and experiences.

1	LEARNING & TEACHING APPROACHES	Lectures, laboratory classes (archaeology), seminars, small group work, individual study based on text books and lecture notes, individual consultations with academic staff, preparing Diploma dissertation.	
2	ASSESSMENT METHODS	Cultural Heritage is a 2nd Cycle Degree Programme, accessed by way of the applicant having previously obtained a sufficient number of ECTS in related subjects, followed by a preliminary colloquio before the student can access the degree course.  This pre-assessment test includes a language test, for reading, translating and understanding of the content and significance of an academic text in one of the European languages other than Italian.  Formative assessment is a fundamental part of the teaching and learning activities.  Throughout the Programme students are encouraged to become independent and self-motivated learners, thriving on challenge and opportunities to think for themselves. Small-group teaching enables also seminar work. Throughout the programme, students are engaged in class discussions, produce critical writing, and plan research for essays and dissertation, building up flexibility, open-mindedness, self-discipline, and self-motivation. Furthermore students are invited to prepare and present Seminars with a variety of structures that involve a high proportion of collaborative learning: the ability to work with others on shared problems or to debate alternative viewpoints. Some taught options also involve group projects, involving more in-depth co-operation on a presentation or on a written assignment. Building up networks of contacts is also a key professional skill that the sheer breadth of teaching facilitates.  Summative assessment is performed in several ways, according to the characteristics of each Module. Written exams (essays), oral exams, oral presentations, continuing assessments, course work evaluation, final comprehensive exam.  Students are informed of the assessment procedure before the courses start and are also provided with previous examples. For the final exam students are asked to write a dissertation (about 15,000 words) which will be on any approved topic relevant to the degree and the taught components. 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#### E | PROGRAMME COMPETENCES

#### 1 GENERIC

The degree programme meets the competences and quality assurance procedures required by the National Higher Education Quality Assurance Agency (AVA) for degree courses at second level and the main national and local employers associations. - iv) Communication skills: Ability to communicate effectively and to present complex information in a concise manner orally and in writing and using ICT and appropriate technical language.
- v) Popularization skills: Ability to communicate with non-experts, including some teaching skills.

#### 2 SUBJECT SPECIFIC

- vi) For Knowledge: Have the capacity to arrange, order, define and recognize works of art and architecture, identify, name and state the context of works of art and architecture.
- vii) For Comprehension/understanding: Classify, locate, describe, observe, recognize and discuss works of art and architecture
- viii) For Application: Demonstrate the significance of works of art and architecture, illustrate and interpret them and write about them.
- **ix)** For Analysis: Analyze, differentiate, appraise and discriminate among works of art and architecture, distinguish, categorize, examine, compare and contrast among works of art and architecture.
- x) For Synthesis: Arrange, organize, initiate, formulate, assemble, and manage a discussion of works of art and architecture; compose, plan and construct a discussion of works of art and architecture; prepare, create, conceptualize and develop analysis and discussion of works of art and architecture.
- xi) For evaluation Evaluate, assess, judge, criticise, compare and appraise works of art and architecture.
- xii) For problem managing Solve and resolve attributions of works of art and architecture, by assessing, identifying, recognising works and deciding a course of action for publishing them.
- **xiii)** For communication Examine, debate, respond, defend, express, question, explain, and articulate discussions about works of art and architecture.

Graduates in *Cultural Heritage*, at 2<sup>nd</sup> Cycle level, are expected to:

- know and understand Italian history and heritage with a focus on cultural and artistic aspects through time, linking with European and world heritage;
- acquire a global view of both the diversity and the major European periods that structure a common heritage (e.g. the artistic styles, main literary movements, etc);
- be able to **engage with** European wide values of specific content, based on its relation to the common European heritage.
- acquire an overview of local/regional/national history and heritage, and the capacity to access the local interest of specific context based on its relation to local heritage and the Italian and European heritage.
- be able to **explore** technological possibilities as means of expression (Web, DVD, CD-ROM, games, mobile technologies, etc) **to identify** different technological solutions and to **understand** the capabilities, specificity and limitations of each medium:
- be able to demonstrate **experience** and **knowledge** of the implementation of heritage policy and principles in the workplace/cultural sector;
- understand the contexts in which heritage policy and principles are applied, and be aware of real-world limitations;
- be able to apply **knowledge** in practical situations, demonstrating critical reflection on the theoretical and philosophical issues raised in core modules:
- be able to **conduct** independent research;
- be able to **construct** a sustained sophisticated and original argument on a specialized topic.

#### F COMPLETE LIST OF PROGRAMME LEARNING OUTCOMES

A newly graduated Master of *Cultural Heritage* will acquire:

- Ability to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of Cultural Heritage fundamentals in: language and terminology of art and architectural history and archaeology as well as analysis of art and architectural objects and archaeological finds.
- Ability to demonstrate knowledge and understanding at a basic level of both "theory based" art and architectural history and "practice based" programmes such as archaeology.
- Ability to apply knowledge and understanding in other areas as storia, metodologie delle ricerche storiche, musicologia, spettacolo, geografia e antropologia culturale, letteratura e teoria della letteratura.
- Ability to perform art historical analysis.
- Acquisition of good working habits concerning both working alone (e.g. diploma thesis) and in teams (e.g. course-work in class), achieving results within a specified time-frame, with an emphasis on awareness about professional integrity and on how to avoid plagiarism.
- Demonstrated proficiency in using English language, including subject area terminology, for literature search.
- Ability to read selectively, to prioritise information, and to organise oral and written presentations of work.
- Ability to engage in discussions, to produce critical writing, to write concisely, and to argue clearly.
- Ability to construct and write in critically-sophisticated but clear language arguments in different contexts and within different time-constraints.
- Ability to work with others on shared problems or to debate alternative viewpoints.
- Capacity to build up networks of contacts.
